Entry Requirements:

Grade B or above in GCSE German. Students should have acquired the knowledge, understanding and skills required at the Higher Tier of entry at GCSE.

What will I study?

The A level course is comprised of 3 papers.

Each unit covers a wide range of topics and subtopics on the following themes:

- Social issues and trends (modern and traditional values, cyberspace, equal rights etc.)
- Political and artistic culture in German-speaking countries (modern day idols, German regional identity, cultural heritage or cultural landscape etc.)



The A level course builds on the knowledge, understanding and skills gained at GCSE. It fosters a range of transferable skills, including communication, critical thinking and creativity, which are valuable to the individual and to society. Students will develop their understanding of themes relating to the society and culture of the countries where German is spoken. They will do so by using authentic spoken and written sources in German.

How will I be assessed?

The final exam will consist of 3 papers.

Paper 1: Listening, reading and writing (50% of A level)

Paper 2: Writing (20% of A level)

Paper 3: Speaking (30% of A level)

You would be well-suited to studying German at A level if you:

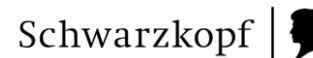
- enjoy languages and want to develop your skills in a range of contexts
