## **Pupil Premium and Free School Meals**

Pupil Premium is extra funding allocated to schools to work with students who have been registered for Free School Meals at any point in the last six years. The government believes that Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address current underlying inequalities between students who are eligible for Free School Meals and their peers. It ensures that funding to tackle disadvantage, reaches the students who need it.

In most cases, the Pupil Premium is paid direct to schools and is allocated to them for every student who receives Free School Meals. Schools decide how to use the funding as they are best placed to assess student needs. The funding is directed specifically at the pupils in receipt of this funding, and could be used for items such as one-to-one or small group tuition, non-academic intervention, or help with costs for trips, equipment, uniform etc. It is discreet and pupils in receipt of it are not singled out in any way. We encourage you to get in touch with us if you think your child may be eligible for funding. The money is available for every child whose parents are receiving certain benefits but the school will only receive the funding if parents register. Please contact us on enquiries@oldfieldschool.com

## Extra funding for children of Service Personnel

There is also extra funding available under Pupil Premium for those children who have a parent currently serving in the armed services, or those whose parents have left the service since April 2011. This provision is made for additional (mainly pastoral) support, so we would be grateful if any Service Personnel could inform the school of their status, so we can record this information on the school system. This information is protected and the data regarding individual children is not shared outside the school. Schools with Service children in Reception to Year 11 classes are eligible to receive the fund, but only if your child's name appears on the school's roll as being a Service child, so please let us know. ## HARMONY RISING AT BATH ABBEY

Harmony Rising is Bath Philharmonia's inclusive creative choir for 11–14-year-olds that celebrates youth voice and enables participants to cocreate, rehearse and perform their own songs. The choir brought together 120 young people from every secondary / senior school in Bath, developing their confidence through creative music-making and performance.

In 2024, inspired by some of the greatest movie themes, Harmony Rising co-created four songs. Let the Wilds Grow explores time travel and the monumental timescales of planet earth and observes that 'Nature is reclaiming, what we have stolen'. Make Yourself at Home celebrates difference and challenges the concept of alien. Forevermore questions the footprint we leave on earth at a Jurassic dinosaur scale. Little Things, Big Difference looks under the microscope and suggests that even the smallest action can have an incredible impact.

The four songs were performed at Bath Abbey during Party in the City on 17 May 2024, accompanied by members of Bath Philharmonia. Two of the songs were performed at The Forum's 90th Anniversary concert, with a symphonic sized Bath Philharmonia and musicians from His Majesty's Royal Marines School of Music.



# School Attendance: The law is changing from 19<sup>th</sup> August 2024

Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing.
The government is introducing a new National Framework for Penalty Notices.

## 5 days of unauthorised absence

Penalty Notice fines may be issued for any term-time absences that are unauthorised (for example, a 5-day term-time holiday) – whether these absences are taken consecutively or cumulatively over a rolling period of 10 school weeks.

## 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any 10-week period

Penalty Notice fines will also be considered when there have been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any rolling period of 10 school weeks.

## A school day has 2 sessions:

## 1 morning and 1 afternoon sessions per day

A school week means any week in which there is at least one school session. The threshold can be met with any combination of unauthorised absence (example, 6 sessions of holiday plus 4 sessions of arriving late after the register closes all within 10 school weeks.) These sessions can be consecutive or not. The period of 10 school weeks can also span different terms or school years. (example, 2 sessions of unauthorised absence in the Summer term and a further 8 within the Autumn term.)

Bath & North-East Somerset Council have the discretion to issue Penalty Notice fines before the above threshold is met in cases where parents are deliberately avoiding the national threshold by taking several Term-Time holidays below the threshold, or for repeated absences for birthdays or other family events.

## Unchanged

Penalty Notice fines are issued per parent, per child.

This means that fines are issued to each parent, for each child who is absent. For example: If 2 siblings are absent for a Term-Time holiday, this will result in each parent receiving 2 separate fines.

## First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time leave of absence or irregular attendance, the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (If paid within 28 days)

Reduced to: £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days

# Second Offence (In a 3-year rolling period)

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time leave of absence or irregular attendance, the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (If paid within 28 days)

There is no reduction in the amount

## Third Offence or Any Further Offences (In a 3-year rolling period)

The third time an offence is committed for a Term-Time leave of absence or irregular attendance, a Penalty Notice will NOT be issued but will be referred to Banes Attendance & Welfare Support Service for **Prosecution** which may result in fines of up to £2,500 per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in a Magistrate's Court can show on a parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

Inset Training days are school days and can therefore be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.
